



Badger Watch

Have you ever seen a badger? They are common in Britain, but they are very difficult to see. They live in 'setts' (=badger houses) in the woods.

Summary

Sophie is in Wales looking for badgers. She is also looking for words with 'igh' in the spelling. A group of children are taken on a badger watch. They learn about badgers, eventually observing them from a hide.

Examples of words containing /igh/ are raised. As the words are noted, a colourful representation is shown on the screen with /igh/ highlighted in colour.
